St. Margaret's is poised for growth. We have a talented and committed faith community that supports local and international outreach, an excellent physical facility with a worship hall and a well-equipped parish center for parish functions, and a perfect location in the most active area of growth in the robust college community of Lawrence, Kansas.

We delight in our Episcopal heritage and liturgies while being passionate about retaining our openness to innovative ways of developing followers of Jesus.

In a casual and welcoming atmosphere, we offer an early traditional service followed by a service known for its contemporary expressions of worship. Both services have provided an open communion table since our inception. In this profile, you will read not only where we come from and who we are but also our vision for the future articulated through our recent survey.

Mission

To share the grace of God in Jesus Christ, empowering followers of Jesus to grow in love for God and neighbor.

Vision

We aspire to be a flourishing and faithful Christian community, belonging to each other and to God.

Values

Receiving God's Grace | We cannot pass on what we have not first received. That which compels everything we do must be first and foremost the grace of God available to us in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We want our community to be thoroughly seasoned by God's grace, such that together we are a people marked by forgiveness, compassion, mercy, and hope, loving people wherever they are at.

Knowing Our Story | Philosopher Alasdair MacIntyre once wrote "I can only answer the question 'What am I to do?' if I can answer the prior question 'Of what story or stories do I find myself a part?'" Each person and each community has a story, and one of life's great challenges is discerning how our stories fit into the grand story of God—the narrative of redemption revealed to us in God's Word, which is what ultimately grounds us as a community. St. Margaret's loves Scripture and we love stories – ours and yours.

Pursuing Christ's Mission | Church is never supposed to be static. We are to be a people on the move, confident in who we are and where we are going. Christ left us with a mission to make disciples – promising to be with us to the end of the age – and we are committed to making that mission a reality.

Belonging & Reconciliation | More than just feeling welcome, humans desire to belong. We desire to belong to God and to each other, even in a world riven by difference and fear. St. Margaret's wants to be a refuge for all people, especially the marginalized, oppressed, and overlooked, where the world sees what God can do with a community focused on belonging and reconciliation.

Transformative Discipleship | Jesus promises to all those that follow him that his burden is easy and that his yoke is light. Paradoxical as it might seem, it's the discipleship of Jesus that can actually set a human being free – free to be that which God is calling them to be.

Practicing Hospitality | Hospitality is one of the central messages in all of Scripture. Hospitality is that process that turns estrangement into reconciliation, alienation into relationship. St. Margaret's strives to be community of authentic hospitality practiced in the name of Christ: opening our doors, serving our community, reaching out our hands in love.

Embracing Sabbath | One of the rarest words one can hear these days is "enough." And that's what Sabbath is all about. It's about having enough. We are a tired and weary people, living in a world that tries to convince us that we need more of whatever it is we're seeking. St. Margaret's wants to be a place of rest – the type of rest that enables us to live abundantly, to give generously, and to be able to intentionally stop and offer thanks for the unceasing goodness of God.

History of St. Margaret’s

In 1987, Bishop Richard Grein challenged Trinity Episcopal Church, Lawrence, Kansas, to consider developing a second parish on the west side of Lawrence. In the summer of 1989, The Reverend Mark Clevenger and several members of Trinity Episcopal Church began calling homes in this area, inviting people to explore this new parish.

By January 1990, small groups of people began meeting in homes and eventually moved to Brandon Woods Retirement Community. In June 1990, the first Sunday worship took place at the proposed church site, and those present voted to name the new congregation after Saint Margaret of Scotland, a patron saint of families and education.



Volunteers then conducted a telethon to generate interest in St. Margaret's, and on the second Sunday of September 1990, the new congregation held its first formal worship service at Quail Run School with almost 300 people attending.

In December 1995, St. Margaret's received a gift of land on west Sixth Street and began making plans to build a new worship center. The parish broke ground in May 1996. In the fall of 1997, the diocese approved the articles of incorporation and formally recognized Saint Margaret's Episcopal Church as a self-supporting parish in the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas. The worship center was completed and dedicated in November 1997.

In November 2004 the Vestry approved construction of a second building on the campus to meet the needs of children, youth, parish fellowship and adult education, and in May 2006, the Parish Center was dedicated for use by the parish.

During the next few years the parish experienced both highs and lows but the members of the parish remained the dedicated, caring and faithful Christians that have always characterized St. Margaret's. In 2019 we called Father Marco Serrano as our rector. Father Marco and the parish were faced with the challenges of the pandemic. We established an online presence, held parking lot services, and retained both our membership and our financial support. We gained new young families and came out of the pandemic with renewed excitement and commitment.

In the late fall of 2022, Father Marco, the Junior Warden and the incoming Senior Warden met with Bishop Bascom and other officials of the diocese to discuss a plan to retire the debt to the diocese the parish incurred for the construction of its two buildings. The parties agreed that St. Margaret's would commence a campaign to raise funds to retire the debt. The diocese agreed that it would match each dollar the parish pledged and collected. In early 2023 the vestry authorized the "Next Dream Campaign." At the conclusion of the campaign the parishioners had pledged over \$700,000, payable over a three-year period. This amount when matched by the diocese is more than enough to retire the debt.

Today's parish is a diverse and excited congregation that loves the church and is open to new ideas and willingly volunteers to help wherever help is needed. Visitors comment on the energy and vitality that they see and feel.

Worship at St. Margaret's Episcopal Church

St. Margaret's nave has an open and contemporary feel with chairs oriented into pew-like rows. The main doors open directly onto the nave without a discrete narthex. We pass the baptismal font as we make our way into the nave and some cross themselves with the holy water contained within. The chancel/sanctuary is open with neither communion nor chancel rails. Parishioners have a variety of personal practices of piety, but the congregation rarely kneels.

Greeters welcome worshipers and serve as ushers. Vested presiders officiate with the support of vested acolytes. Lectors read from an ambo and Eucharistic Ministers join the altar party for the distribution of Communion without vestments. We receive communion at stations in the crossing and a member of our Prayer Team offers individuals private prayer during communion.

Children are welcome in our worship and encouraged to be themselves.

8am: Rite I

15-20 worshipers

Quiet and spacious without music

The congregation uses physical Books of Common Prayer

10am: Rite II with some EOW

100-110 worshipers

Music mixes Contemporary selections with the 1982 Hymnal and is supported by a staff musician with a parishioner band: 3-5 vocalists, piano, guitar, bass and drums.

While Books of Common Prayer are available, most of the congregation follows the service on one of two HD televisions. Our tech team streams the service to YouTube (<https://www.youtube.com/@saintmargarets>) and supports worship monitoring the soundboard and worship slides.

Most Sundays Children attend a Godly Play lesson during the Ministry of the Word, rejoining corporate worship at the Peace.

Children & Youth Ministry



St. Margaret's cares deeply about the spiritual growth and education of our children and youth. We offer a variety of educational programming for our youngest members year round. The Lenten Pen Pal Program is widely appreciated among the congregation. All children and youth from ages 3-18 are paired with an adult in the church who sends them one letter a week throughout the season of Lent. This allows the children to get to know and interact with different adults in the congregation each year. Recently a visitor to Saint Margaret's remarked that they were touched by how they observed children interacting with those from other generations before and after the service. These relationships are often a direct result of the Pen Pal Program. In 2024 we will create more opportunities for the Pen Pals to interact so we can continue to strengthen these intergenerational friendships.

Our Shrove Tuesday and Easter Egg hunt would not be possible without our incredibly helpful youth volunteers who are skilled at mixing up pancakes and finding truly creative ways to hide Easter eggs. The congregation also enjoyed a Fall Fest which included a chili contest, bounce house, and pumpkin decorating. The Community Life Committee provides an incredible amount of support for most of our events, for which we are all thankful.





In the Fall of 2022 we began inviting preschoolers into the nursery to have their own lesson during children’s chapel. Each week the preschoolers enjoy music, a Bible story, crafts, and snacks. The preschool children enjoy being leaders for the 0–2 year-olds, playing with them and encouraging them to participate in the lesson. Saint Margaret’s newly re-decorated nursery is a welcoming and safe space. We are blessed to have many people who poured their time and talents into creating this wonderful space for our youngest church members.

Youth and Children’s Formation Classes are available when Adult Formation classes meet. Godly Play is a Montessori-inspired curriculum used during the school year for children’s chapel time. The routine for each Sunday morning includes a greeting, changing the church calendar, a Godly Play story, and “feast” time in which we share a small snack. A skilled children’s staff thoughtfully leads our programming year-round, and committed volunteers make it all possible.

The Saint Margaret’s Playgroup meets monthly. This is a great opportunity for parents to socialize and for kids to play. Family Ministries also coordinates meal trains for new parents. We are looking forward to expanding these services to provide more support and socialization opportunities in 2024.

COMMUNITY

Welcome to our town of Lawrence, located in the hills of Northeast Kansas along the banks of the Kansas (Kaw) and Wakarusa Rivers, where God paints the sky each day with beautiful sunrises and sunsets. Lawrence is situated about 40 miles west of Kansas City and 20 miles east of Topeka. Approximately 100,000 persons live in Lawrence, making it the sixth largest city in Kansas. Kansas City International Airport is located approximately one hour away and is a Midwestern hub for national and international travel.

History

Charles Robinson, who later served as governor of Kansas, founded Lawrence in 1854 for the New England Emigrant Aid Company. The city was named after Amos Adams Lawrence, a prominent politician and antislavery partisan.

In the bleeding Kansas era, Lawrence was a center of anti-slavery sentiment. On May 21, 1856, a pro-slavery posse burned the Free State Hotel, destroyed the equipment of the anti-slavery newspapers, and looted several other businesses in an attack known as the “Sack of Lawrence.” On August 21, 1863, Confederate guerrillas led by William Quantrill burned many of the houses and most of the commercial buildings in Lawrence and killed 150 - 200 of the men they found, an event known as “Quantrill’s Raid.”

Demographics

The population of Lawrence has grown steadily in the last twenty years, maintaining that small-town, historic feel while offering its residents everything they need in one community.

St. Margaret’s is located in the area of northwest Lawrence most near the city quadrant of 6th Street and Wakarusa. This quadrant has the fourth largest area (out of 17 quadrants) of Community Commercial Centers (retail space) and is the fastest growing residential and commercial area of Lawrence.

Two new major community and economic developments are:

Sports Pavilion Lawrence is Lawrence's newly constructed \$24 million, 181,000-square-foot public recreation center located in Rock Chalk Park, an area of approximately 89 acres.

LMH Health has constructed a \$93 million outpatient medical building in west Lawrence directly south of Rock Chalk Park. The approximately 200,000-square-foot facility includes an enlarged Lawrence Surgery Center, an orthopedic center, therapy, and multiple medical offices.

Climate

Lawrence enjoys the richness and variety of four seasons. The days are mostly sunny with average high temperatures of 85-95 degrees in the summer and average low temperatures of 20-30 degrees in the winter. Winter arrives in mid-November and spring thaws occur in March/April. The winter snowfall median is 10 inches with a snow depth of at least one inch.

Education

High educational standards are driven by a community where 50% of its residents hold bachelor's degrees or higher. The Lawrence Public Schools district includes twelve elementary schools, four junior high schools, and two high schools.

Private schools include Bishop Seabury Academy (grades 6 – 12), which is affiliated with the Episcopal Church, and Veritas Christian School (K – 12), a non-denominational school. There are two schools funded by the Catholic communities: St. John's Catholic School and Corpus Christi School. There are numerous private Montessori schools in Lawrence ranging from preschool to 7th grade.

The University of Kansas is the largest public university in the state with a total enrollment of nearly 29K including the University of Kansas Medical School, School of Nursing and School of Allied Health located at the Kansas City campus. The University of Kansas has more than 400 degree and certificate programs and is home to the nationally recognized Kansas Jayhawks athletics programs.

Haskell Indian Nations University offers free tuition to members of registered Native American tribes and has an average enrollment of more than 1,000 students. The University offers four-year Bachelor of Arts and Sciences degrees and two-year Associate Degrees.

Health

Lawrence Memorial Health (LMH), a community not-for-profit health system, provides health care in Lawrence and its surrounding communities. The hospital is accredited by The Joint Commission (TJC), who also recognized LMH with Advanced Certification for Stroke, Certification for Chest Pain, and as a Pioneer Quality Data Contributor.

Currently, LMH Health includes a 174-bed hospital in Lawrence, Kansas, as well as a strong network of clinics throughout the area, including primary care, specialists, and therapy services.

There are 273 physicians on staff at LMH Health, including 55 primary care physicians and over 100 specialists who practice in multiple areas such as cardiology, endocrinology, neurology, obstetrics and gynecology, oncology, orthopedics and pulmonology.

Culture/Interesting Places to Visit

The city is known for a thriving music and art scene. The Lawrence Arts Center sponsors activities and classes for all ages, organized plays, and an art gallery filled with artwork created by local and international artists. Theater Lawrence has popular shows, acted and directed by local talent.

Additional local attractions include the Downtown Farmer's Market, Watkins Museum of History, Baker Wetlands and Discovery Center, miles of biking and walking paths, the Busker Festival and Free State Festival, and Civil War history sites. Clinton Lake is three miles southwest of Lawrence with opportunities for water recreation.

Located in historical downtown Lawrence, Massachusetts Street, referred to by locals as Mass street, is a popular shopping and social hub of the city and is filled with restaurants, galleries, shops, and musical venues.

The University of Kansas is home to many museums, including the KU Natural History Museum, Spencer Museum of Art, Booth Family Hall of Athletics, and The DeBruce Center, which is home to Naismith's original rules of "basketball." The Robert J. Dole Institute of Politics houses various displays from the life of the former Kansas Senator and frequently hosts well-known political speakers. The Lied Center is well known for a wide variety of entertainment from ballet and classical music to plays, comedy, and contemporary music. Haskell Indian Nations University is the home of the American Indian Athletic Hall of Fame and the Haskell Cultural Center.

Sports

Along with elementary, junior high, and high school programs, Lawrence offers a wide variety of community-based sports opportunities. Lawrence Parks and Recreation Department offers various team, sports, dance, fitness, and water activities. Several popular golf courses are in the area.

FAMILY PROMISE

St. Margaret's once again opened their doors to families experiencing houselessness. After a hiatus due to COVID and other factors, we hosted several families through Family Promise. Congregation members worked together to get the Parish Hall ready for families, and provided food, snacks, and company to the families.

TRINITY FOOD PANTRY

St. Margaret's is one of five congregations that provide donations to the Trinity Food Pantry, based at Trinity Episcopal Church. In 2023 we continued the tradition of hosting the annual Pantry Power event where we donated huge (trucks and SUV loads) amounts of food and paper ware.

KANSAS TO KENYA (K2K)

St Margaret's continues to support the Kansas to Kenya (K2K) medical mission. K2K is a Diocese-based mission focused on supporting the international Sustainable Development Goals.

The Community Team focuses on Agatha's Amani House, a safe-house for women who are victims of domestic violence. Historically they funded 2 very active libraries in Nakuru and Maaui Mahiu. Ongoing support is also provided for Karati School for developmentally disabled children and adults.

The Medical Team provides internal medicine, family medicine, and dental clinics for 3 - 4 sites each year. Working closely with our Kenyan medical partners, they treat thousands of patients each year providing free visits, diagnostics, treatment, and medications. This team in concert with pharmacy faculty from the University of Kansas and University of Nairobi developed a now widely accepted certificate program teaching pharmacists in Kenya how to administer vaccinations. They also sponsor 2 Kenyan pharmacy students for intern rotations in the U.S. each year.

St Margaret's is a wonderful host for the primary fundraiser the K2K Medical Team each year in April, which supports fielding 2-3 teams each year.

BACKSNACK PROGRAM

The BackSnack program provides a weekly backpack filled with nutritious child friendly food for hungry elementary age schoolchildren to take home over the weekend. BackSnack is a partnership between Harvesters Food Bank, St. Margaret's Episcopal Church and Trinity Episcopal Church.

MISSION TO NEPAL

Karín Feltman has lived and worked in Nepal since 2014. She is a registered nurse whose focus is human trafficking prevention, vulnerability mitigation, and girl's/women's health initiatives. Karín splits her time between Kathmandu and a remote village 9 miles from the border of Tibet.

When in Kathmandu, Karín does bible study and mentoring at a local girls' safe home, as well as serves on the leadership team of an anti-trafficking prayer and networking group.

In the village, Karín operates a women's sewing center that employs 10 women. They sew washable, reusable sanitary pad kits that they distribute for free to the girls in the local schools so that they can attend school every day. They also provide basic women's health education to all girls and boys class 6 and above to help dispel myths and taboos surrounding menstruation. The women also make handicrafts, working toward sustainability. This program provides much-needed opportunity and income for the women in the sewing group, allowing them to support their families while remaining in their communities.

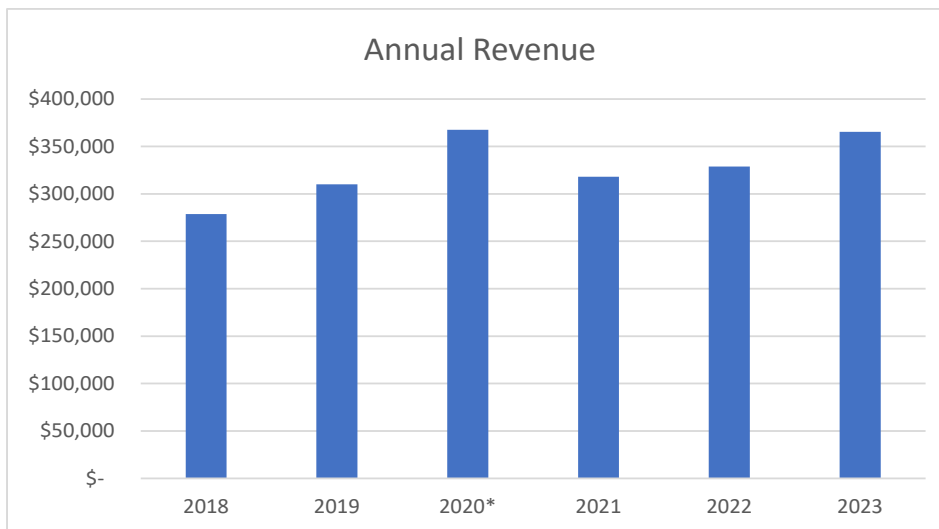
Mission to Nepal also supports a scholarship program in 2 remote villages, providing funds for 90 at-risk (for exploitation) children to attend school. This program now includes higher education, as well, with 6 children studying in Bachelor's programs.

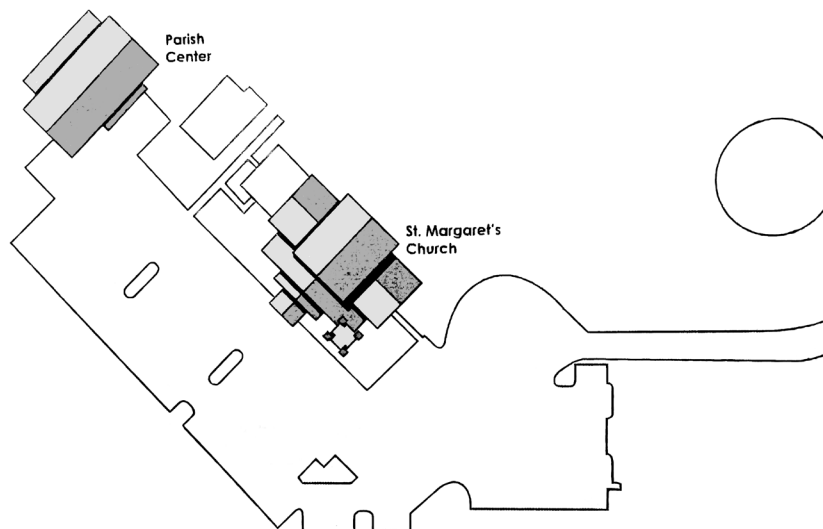

Campus

St. Margaret's campus is conveniently located in the rapidly growing area of northwest Lawrence, Kansas. Near major highways and a large residential community, St. Margaret's, with its unique architectural style, stands out against the gently rolling hills and beautiful sunsets of northeastern Kansas. The simplicity of the Worship Center creates a worship space where the presence of the Holy Spirit centers our worship. The Worship Center houses the worship space, classrooms, office space and a small kitchen. The Parish Center houses a small worship space/activity center, commercial kitchen facilities, offices, and additional classrooms. Spacious parking areas and a children's playground make St. Margaret's campus a special place to be for worship and fellowship.



The Diocese OF KANSAS



The Episcopal Diocese of Kansas includes more than 10,000 people worshipping in 44 congregations throughout the eastern portion of the state of Kansas. Parishes range in size from 2,200 members to small congregations in urban, suburban, small town, and rural areas of the Sunflower State. The Diocese was founded in 1859, preceding Kansas statehood by two years. The Diocese stands in the center of the United States and also within the broad center of the Episcopal Church. Parishes may be high church or more evangelical, but all are in the broad middle of faithful Episcopalians who seek to be faithful followers of our Lord.

Rev. Cathleen Chittenden Bascom, D.Min., from the Diocese of Iowa, was elected in October 2018 as the 10th bishop to lead the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas. She is the first woman to be elected bishop since the diocese was formed in 1859.
